OUR WORK (THEMATIC SECTOR CAPACITY)



Ark Development Organization (ADO) works alongside the Ghana Health Service to improve access to quality health services; that include provision of health infrastructure (Construction of CHPS Compounds and WASH facilities), information and surveillance, Case management (diagnosis and treatment support), capacity building of health officers and community health volunteers, awareness creation and Advocacy.



EDUCATION

ADO's uses community mobilization strategies such as awareness creation and people-centred advocacy to promote the development initiatives of children, the youth, women and persons with disabilities (Education and ICT). Our educational intervention centres on; provision of educational infrastructure (construction of school building, Libraries and ICT Centres), provision of Teaching and Learning Materials (TLMs) for needy students and Advocacy on School Feeding Programme. Most of our educational advocacy interventions have ensured equal access to basic education by vulnerable groups.



ENVIRONMENT, CLIMATE CHANGE, WATER, SANITATION AND HYGIENE

ADO's programme seek to address some of the critical gaps in water infrastructure, basic sanitation facilities and hygiene, targeting communities that are hard-to-reach, prone to diseases as a result of WASH. We work closely with MMDAs and other CSOs to support the provision of WASH facilities.

Our team of experienced water engineers, hydrogeologists, drilling team, public health officers and technicians are at the core of our operations, designing and implementing quality programmes to support communities' WASH needs.

ADO has over the years supported communities, schools and health centres with WASH facilities. In addition, ADO has supported that and mobilized communities to take their own action to eliminate open defecation, and behaviour



change communication through school health clubs, WASH committees, and hygiene promoters.



GOOD GOVERNANCE, HUMAN AND CHILD RIGHTS

ADO works alongside key actors to create a protective environment that cares for and supports the wellbeing of women, children, the youth and PWDs; this includes working with communities structures such as Traditional Authorities, Religious Leaders, Assembly Members as key influencers, to change attitudes and practices that hinder women, children and PWDs from fulfilling their potential.

Through collective advocacy at both local and national level, alongside like-minded CSOs, we are continuously engaging the government to strengthen policy and legal frameworks that support the wellbeing of women, children and PWDs. Participation interventions undertaken were geared towards women and Persons with Disabilities.



AGRICULTURE

ADO has diverse experience in supporting communities to strengthen their food security and livelihoods and increase household income of farmers. This is through empowering and equipping farmer groups and extension officers with knowledge, skills and technologies in crop establishing community production, seed agribusiness skills, mechanized systems, agriculture in a bid to improve food security and nutrition.

In Nsawam, for example, ADO has partnered with the private sector, fruit buying institutions to facilitate farmers' access to ready market, as well as providing easy ways to adopt agro-ecology.



COVID-19



OUR TEAM

The governance structure of Ark Development Organization (ADO), is well structured with a human resource policy which outlines the roles of all the office holders; with the internal administrative procedures:

there are 5 Board of Directors who oversee the operations of the organization and also take strategic decisions that run the organization. ADO's Board consists of four (4) females and one (1) male. Their expertise varies from community development planning, fundraising, field research, education and Skills Development, Training and Innovation, programme development, management and health administration.

Our dedicated project management team comprises professionals with diverse backgrounds and expertise in programme management, advocacy, research and data analysis, community ADO has over 90 community volunteers that support with the implementation of interventions.

We have nine (9) full-time staff members including project coordinators, project officers, monitoring and evaluation officers, finance officers, field officers and administrative officers. Additionally, ADO collaborate with a network of consultants and volunteers who contributes their skills and knowledge to our projects.

MONITORING, EVALUATION, AND LEARNING

We prioritize monitoring, evaluation, and learning to ensure the effectiveness and impact of our interventions. We employ robust monitoring mechanisms, collect relevant data, and conduct rigorous

For immediate changes; ADO undertakes monitoring visits to project communities and stakeholders to assess the changes from the interventions carried out. In addition, ADO uses feedback mechanisms such as questionnaires, surveys and verbal feedbacks to assess immediate changes of an activity or intervention.

For interim changes; ADO develops indicators to track changes and progress. Data is then collected against these indicators to evaluate the degree of change achieved for adjustments to be made if necessary.

In the long term; ADO undertake impact evaluations where a terms of reference for performance evaluation is developed for consultants to apply at the end of each intervention. These consultants collect both quantitative and qualitative data by engaging the targeted groups and analyzed. These evaluations help to establish and attribute changes to specific interventions.

evaluations to measure outcomes and identify areas for improvement. By continuously learning and adapting, we enhance our capacity to create sustainable change.

RESOURCES AND INFRASTRUCTURE

ADO possesses the necessary resources and infrastructure to implement projects efficiently. This includes office space, equipment, technology, and a strong network of local partners. We are committed to responsible financial management, ensuring transparency and accountability in all our operations.

GRANTS MANAGEMENT

How we manage the funding we receive is extremely important to us because of our calling to respond to the needs of the most vulnerable. Therefore, one of our top priorities is to be the trusted partner of choice in the humanitarian sector by leveraging our financial resources for positive and lasting impact.

ADO's financial management system outlines systematic processes which involves tracking and analyzing financial information to ensure effectiveness and accountability. The organization monitors its budget by assigning unique codes to all income sources, expenditure categories and projects and this facilitate accurate recording, reporting and analyzing of financial information. In addition, ADO maintains up-to-date financial records detailing income received (grants and donations), programme expenses and administrative costs. ADO's budget monitoring tool helps to regularly compare actual expenditures against budgeted amounts which helps identify any variances or deviations and enables timely actions to be undertaken. Also, ADO's financial management system ensures that funds received are tracked against project contract amounts. At the end of every financial year (i.e. 1st January to 31st December), ADO prepares financial reports that include income statements, statement of financial position and cash flow statements which



provides insights into the organization's financial health, spending patterns and adherence. After which external audits is conducted by independent auditors.

DONORS AND PARTNERS OVER THE YEARS

ADO has been able to establish and nurture good relationships with key donors to strengthen its grants portfolio. Amidst a difficult funding environment, ADO was able to attract funding from these donors and partners over the years.
